

## A MESSAGE FROM THE CENTURY HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL...

The long season is in full swing at Century High School and we are looking forward to ending the year as strong as we've started. **The winter season brought many highlights to our school as students continued to show why CHS Knights are the best.** Our Boys and Girls Basketball teams and our Cheerleaders each won a County title. Our Cheerleaders and Boys Basketball teams each competed at States for the first time in school history ~ the fan support throughout the playoffs was a great thing to see grow with each win! Additionally, students in our science program showed everyone how talented we are by winning the County STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) competition, while students placed highest among all Carroll high schools at the Liberty Physics Olympics! In our February newsletter, we highlighted the accomplishments of our All-State Orchestra and Band students, while our Chorus students recently returned from their county judging with the highest marks ever! Currently, the spring musical "Oliver" is showing, with two nights remaining. This show is fantastic and a "must see"! I hope you get a chance to see our students on stage. All of this success is evidenced by Century High School's having the highest attendance rate in our county for high schools at approximately 96% (the state standard for Excellent rating)!

**Positive results in clubs and extracurricular activities help us achieve better attendance rates. A high attendance rate also helps students perform well in the classroom.** This is evidenced by the success our students continue to have on their High School Assessments. Data from January testing is back and we are notifying students who failed their exams first in order to plan ways to help them pass. All scores will be released very soon! As mentioned in our eschool newsletter, Advanced Placement (AP) exams need to be ordered soon. We have approximately 700 seats in Advanced Placement courses this year and hope to see students challenge themselves by taking the corresponding exam. Exams are valuable in many ways ~ they help students get into college, potentially earn college credit, and results help students determine how prepared they are for college level work. **AP Exams are another way that students can set themselves apart as they prepare for the college admission process. March 20 is the deadline to order tests (\$86 each).** Please contact Mr. Hembree, Guidance Counselor, at (410) 386-4400 for more information.

We also have many several programs designed to help students achieve better results in class. **Our AM Help program continues to offer tutoring before school to students on a "drop in" basis. Teachers and student tutors are available as early as 7:15am in the Media Center.** Students do not go to homeroom and can get help all the way until 8:00am. Another program designed for students in need of ALGEBRA assistance is the after school Special Education grant program. This is explained within this newsletter. We hope students take advantage of this opportunity to get help needed to pass the Algebra HSA. **One new program to CHS is the 9<sup>th</sup> Grade "Homework Club".** This "club" is designed for students who have trouble getting their homework finished. Teachers assign students to the homework club during lunch and after school. The purpose is to require students to complete assignments. We see a direct correlation between failing grades and students not doing their homework. For our 9<sup>th</sup> grade students, we are telling them that assignments must be done or we will see them in the "Homework Club". This program is also open to students who WANT extra help. Students can come to the after school program to get help in finishing assignments. It is not strictly a punishment. Many students have brought their grades up once they started with this program. **Please contact Mrs. Karen Wright (Assistant Principal) for more information.**

**Lastly, we will be piloting a "FLEX PERIOD" for students beginning in the 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter.** You might ask, "What is a Flex Period"? The idea is to create a smaller period of time (approximately 30 minutes) during the day when students can get help from their teachers. We will use a modified Advisory Bell Schedule to provide time for students to meet with teachers (on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday) during the pilot period. Teachers can request to see students who need help AND students can ask to see teachers. Help might be to get ready for an AP exam; it might be for an upcoming High School Assessment; it could be to get some help in a tough class. All of these reasons are good reasons for a student to seek the help from a teacher. Study groups will form; students will use their Agenda Books for passes; Teachers will determine which students to see on each day; all in the hope of creating a time for students to do what it takes to be more successful. The Advisory period will be "home base" for students not seeking extra help during the **FLEX PERIOD**. We will be teaching students about this program in the coming weeks so please talk with them about the idea. We hope this program goes well so we can determine whether to run it on a larger scale next year.

Finally, we'd like to thank those parents and students who attended the midyear School Improvement Team meeting to chart progress and get input about what graduates from CHS should know and be able to do. During this meeting we reviewed our goals and progress. Our hope is to see Academy Programs continue to strengthen and help students meet the challenges that await them after high school. All indicators show that right now we are on the right track – go Knights!"

# SENIOR INTERNSHIP APPLICATION MEETING

If you have a junior who is interested in participating in an Internship in their senior year, there will be an Application Meeting after school at 2:45 in the Media Center on April 1st. The meeting should take no longer than 40 minutes depending on student questions. Students who are interested in an internship at Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Lab should expect to stay afterwards for 10 minutes because their application essay is different than other interns.

### **As a reminder:**

Students wanting to complete an internship must have a Career Major or home school Completer which can be found in the Green Pathway to Careers booklet. Every advisor has one and your student should also have one. Career Majors are **NOT** Academy career strands and should not be confused with them in regards to meeting Internship coursework requirements. Career & Tech have their own completers and internship programs. If your student attends CCCTC, the coordinator at that school will place the student in an internship, not Mrs. DeSalvo. Students wanting an internship must have a 2.5 GPA and 94% attendance. Service Learning Hours must be completed. HSA's must be passed. A student must also be able to provide their own transportation for an internship and have health insurance in order to participate in an internship. It is advisable that a student participate in a ½ day or full day job shadow this spring to help them decide if a particular business is of interest to them.

# OUR TEENS AND PRESCRIPTION DRUG ABUSE

Adolescents abuse more prescription drugs than any other illicit drug, except marijuana; more than cocaine, heroin, and methamphetamine combined. A study released in April, 2005 reveals an alarming one in five teens (4.3million) has abused a pain reliever to get high. The most commonly abused prescription drugs include **painkillers** like Vicodin, OxyContin, Percocet, and Tylenol with codeine; **anti-anxiety medications** and **muscle relaxants** like Paxil, Xanax, Valium, and Soma; **sleeping pills** like Ambien; and **stimulants** (used to treat ADD/ADHD) like Adderall, Ritalin, Dexedrine, and Concerta; all of which are either taken in pill form at higher-than-prescribed doses or crushed and snorted. For the first time, teens are more likely to have abused a prescription painkiller to get high than they are to have experimented with a variety of illicit drugs.

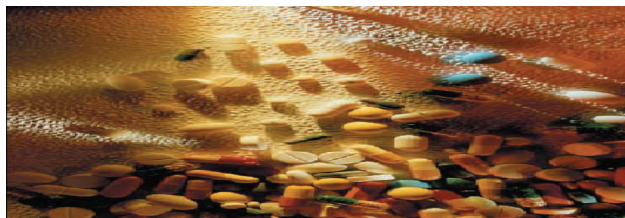
Every day, 2,500 kids age 12-17 abuse a prescription painkiller for the first time. More people are becoming addicted to prescription drugs; drug treatment admissions for prescription painkillers increased more than 300 % from 1995 to 2005.

Adolescents are turning to prescription drugs because many believe the myth that these drugs provide a "safe" high because they come from a pharmacy. Especially troubling is that the majority of teens who abuse prescription drugs say they are easy to get and are often free. We may be unintentionally providing our teens a new way to get high. Most teens who abuse prescription drugs claim they get them from home, or from friends and relatives. It is important for parents to recognize that not all drug threats to their children come from the street corner.

The harm to abusers is evident in the statistics showing the almost 300% increase in emergency room visits involving prescription drugs in recent years, and the near doubling of treatment admissions for abuse of pain relievers. Abuse rates among Maryland youth also track national figures. Juvenile admissions to treatment for prescription drugs rose from 186 to 420 between 1999 and 2003. This 126% increase dwarfs the 11% increase in juvenile admissions for overall drug treatment. In 2002, 8.4% of 12th graders reported having used prescription narcotics, 11.4% had abused prescription stimulants, and 6.5% had used tranquilizers. The data by itself, however, sanitizes the full story. This data leaves out the anguish of parents who find out too late that their teenager was abusing a fatal cocktail of narcotics. It fails to capture the lost promise of the student who drops out of school to feed his or her habit. As with illicit drugs, prescription drug abuse exacts a heavy price from those who become its victims.

Some specific signals of being under the influence you can try to pick up on include, but are not limited to:

- Excessive energy
- Excessive drowsiness
- Inability to concentrate
- Lowered inhibitions
- Increased secrecy

- Dramatic and compelling but vague complaints
- Constricted or dilated pupils
- Flushed face and neck
- Slowed breathing
- Lowered blood pressure

### Sensory alteration

Other signs and symptoms may vary, but parents should be alert to the following: personality changes, mood swings, irritability, avoiding sleep, sweating, loss of appetite, forgetfulness, or clumsiness. Watch for signs around the house such as missing pills, unfamiliar pills, or empty cough and cold medicine bottles or packages. If your teen has a prescription, keep control of the bottle. Be alert to your teen running out of pills quickly, losing pills, or requesting refills. Other signs might include loss of interest in personal appearance, borrowing money or having extra cash, skipping classes, or not doing well in school.

The need has never been greater for parents to learn the facts about this dangerous behavior which has become cemented among teens. Prescription drugs are in practically every home. Parents can have an immediate impact on stopping teen prescription drug abuse. Research indicates that both parents and teens have a dangerous misconception that abusing medicines is safer than using street drugs, and that is simply not true. Research shows many parents are not aware of teen prescription drug abuse and are not discussing the dangers with their teens. Only a third of parents (36%) have discussed the risks of prescription drugs with their teen, even though research shows that parental disapproval is a powerful way to keep teens away from using drugs. Parents are the most important influence in helping teens make healthy choices, and talking about the dangers of intentional prescription and over-the-counter drug abuse must be at the forefront of parent-teen conversations.

**CARROLL COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS**  
**OUT-OF-DISTRICT REQUESTS FOR THE 2009 - 2010 SCHOOL YEAR**

On January 20, 2009, out-of-district applications will be available in school offices. Board policy states that students who attend Carroll County Public Schools shall attend school in their designated attendance area. However, in very specific and limited circumstances, students may be placed in a school outside their attendance area if an approvable circumstance is deemed to exist.

Parents/legal guardians desiring an out-of-district placement for their child should carefully review the list of approvable circumstances listed on the back of the out-of-district application to determine whether the child meets the criteria for approval. The Carroll County Public Schools' out-of-district policy and regulation will be strictly adhered to in making decisions regarding admission of students to schools outside of their assigned attendance area.

All other Carroll County Public Schools will be designated as "CLOSED" for the 2009-2010 school year. This means that any out-of-district application submitted for placement to a "CLOSED" school for the 2009-2010 school year will be denied unless it meets the limited criteria for admission to a "CLOSED" school.

Parents/legal guardians who plan to submit out-of-district applications for the 2009-2010 school year need to be aware of the following procedures:

- It is the parent's/legal guardian's responsibility to obtain an out-of-district application from the school office or the Student Services Department. These applications will be available on January 20, 2009, *but not before*. Please be certain that the application obtained is for the 2009-2010 school year. Completed out-of-district applications may not be returned to the school office.
- The deadline for out-of-district applications for the 2009-2010 school year is **April 1, 2009**. Completed applications must be **postmarked or personally delivered** by the deadline date to:

- Applications postmarked/received after the deadline date of **April 1, 2009** will be returned to the sender without consideration.
