Health Room News

Reminder to all parents:

Our cold winter months are upon us, which bring our cold and flu season. Listed are our guidelines you might wish to follow in determining if your child should attend school.

Please note it is school policy that a student be kept home during the course of a **fever** and for an **additional 24 hours** after the fever has passed and without fever reducing medications.

Strep throat is highly contagious. Your child should be kept at home and treated with antibiotics as prescribed by a pediatrician. Your child may return to school after 24 hours of antibiotics and is fever free.

A **cough** can indicate severe cold, bronchitis, flu, or even pneumonia. Some may suffer one cold after another due to underlying illnesses, such as asthma, all winter long. If child is not acting like themselves (i.e., lethargic, listless, difficulty breathing, and/or constantly coughing), this could warrant a visit to your pediatrician's office. **Children are allowed to have non-medicated cough drops at school. These cough drops should be taken to the school nurse by a parent.

Conjunctivitis/pink eye is highly contagious! Please pay attention when your child tell you their eyes burn, itch or feel scratchy and have

drainage. You must keep your child home from school until 24 hours of treatment with an antibiotic eye drop or they are symptom-free or if you have a doctor's note.

Kindergarten parents - Please consider sending in a change of clothes for your child. The clothing will remain at school and used if needed.



Only Parents , NOT students, transport medications!

Parent Drop Off

Please remember that if you are just dropping off your child or children in the morning in the parent drop off car line, please pull to the curb and allow the students to exit your car safely and quickly. If for any reason you need to assist your child in exiting the car or to carry materials to the lobby or office, please park your car in the parking lot.

Parked cars should not be left in the car drop off line; running cars without drivers are a safety hazard. Please be courteous to the other parents and to our buses by following this procedure.

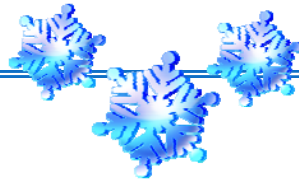


Reporting An Absence

ELA:

Grade 3: Students are exploring interpretive questions, questions that have more than one answer, using the story "An Angel for Solomon Singer".

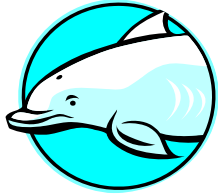

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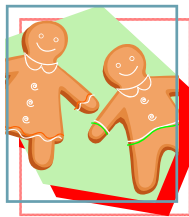

Student Services News...Proof of Residence

Very often students' addresses change during the course of the school year, and parents/guardians are unaware of the procedures necessary to change their children's records. (Please know that if you do move out of the Friendship Valley attendance area during the school year, with the permission of our Pupil Personnel Worker, Mr. Mark Bugbee, your child **MAY BE PERMITTED TO STAY FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE SCHOOL YEAR.**) **ALL** address changes must be documented by an appropriate proof of residence as mandated by state guidelines.

Acceptable documents for proof of residence include:

- ~ A signed rental/lease agreement on a home/apartment in which you are residing;
- ~ Rent Receipt*;
- ~ Recent bill* of service delivered to the residence (i.e., electric, land-line phone, cable, oil or water);
- ~ Recent mortgage statement/bill specifically notating Primary Residence;
- ~ Signed Settlement Document;
- ~ Deed (must show house number, street name and name of parent/legal guardian);
- ~ Notarized Residence Verification Statement accompanied by an acceptable proof of residency for the owner/lessee of the property.

*Date on document must be within 60 days of enrollment.

Once said document is received, the student's records will be updated.

Thank you all for your support of our Book Fair! We had a terrific turn out at both of our family nights and we couldn't have done it without all of our fantastic volunteers! This year's Book Fair was the best we've had in 7 years! PBIS and Dynamic Dolphins

PBIS includes school-wide procedures and processes intended for:

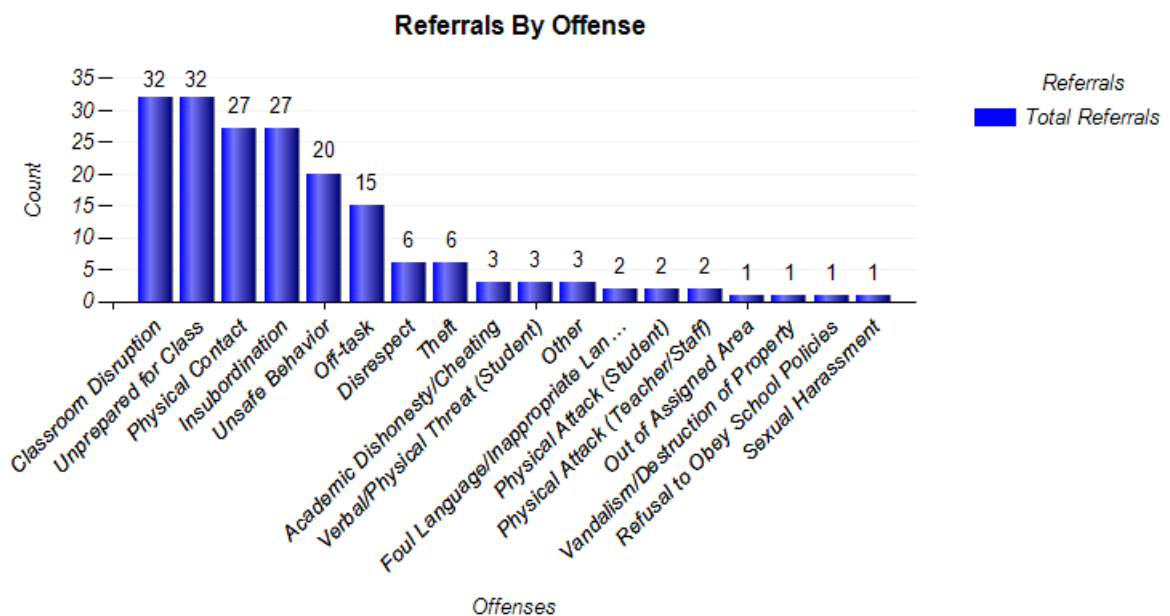
- **ALL** students, **ALL** staff and in **ALL** settings
- Non-classroom settings within the school environment
- Individual classrooms and teachers, and
- Individual student supports



What is PBIS? (**P**ositive **B**ehavioral **I**ntervention and **S**upport) PBIS is a process for creating safer and more effective schools. At Friendship Valley Elementary, the PBIS program is our DYNAMIC DOLPHIN program. Students are expected to Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Ready to Learn. Students receive Dolphin WAVES as positive reinforcement for positive behavior. Students have with their teachers identified a Menu of rewards for their classrooms and grade levels. Students earn these rewards through acquiring a set number of Dolphin WAVES. Student names are also randomly selected each week for a photo opportunity for inclusion on our WAVE in the main hallway. Students were also able to attend a school-wide celebration this quarter that celebrated our overall success with behavior. 95.4% of our students earned 0 to 1 referrals this past quarter, 3.6% earned 2 to 5 referrals and 1% of our students earned 6 or more referrals. The PBIS team at Friendship Valley meets on a monthly basis and will continue to review and revise the Dynamic Dolphin program to ensure it meets the goal of Positive Rewards for Positive Behavior. PBIS is a systems approach to enhancing the capacity of schools to educate all children by developing research-based, school wide, and classroom discipline systems. The process focuses on improving a school's ability to teach and support positive behavior for all students.

Holiday Hazards: Safety Information

The **Maryland Poison Center** receives many calls about exposures to holiday decorations, plants, and other seasonal products. Here are some “holiday hazards”:

Ornaments are made of glass, thin metal, Styrofoam, or wood and can break easily. Ingesting may cause cuts and esophageal obstructions. Very old ornaments or ornaments from other countries may contain lead.

The liquid in **bubble lights** is usually methylene chloride. Ingesting can result in lethargy, respiratory depression, changes in blood pressure and heart rate and GI upset may occur. Methylene chloride is partially metabolized to carbon monoxide; elevated carboxyhemoglobin levels may be noted. **Lamp oils** and **air fresheners** contain hydrocarbons that can easily be aspirated by small children, if ingested. Children experiencing significant coughing and choking must be evaluated in an emergency room for possible aspiration pneumonitis.

Most **snow globes** contain plastic or calcium carbonate in water; however, snow globes containing ethylene glycol (antifreeze) in concentrations as high as 20% have recently been discovered. Most have no ingredients listed on their labels.

Small children may have access to unattended and left over **alcoholic beverages**. Other sources of ethanol include **after shaves, mouthwashes, colognes, and perfumes**. Ingesting can lead to inebriation, lethargy, coma and hypoglycemia in toddlers.

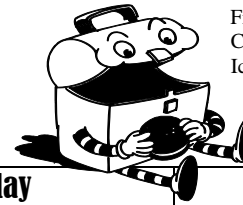
Contrary to popular beliefs, **poinsettias** do not cause toxicity other than a mild dermal or gastrointestinal symptoms. **Holly berries** can cause nausea and vomiting, if eaten in quantity. Most **mistletoe** in the United States is a variety that causes minimal GI symptoms only.



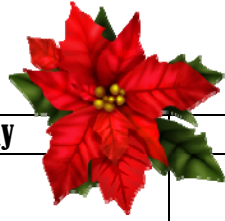
Here are Some Ideas for Ways to Simplify the Holidays

- GIVE THE GIFT OF TIME by creating your own gift card for a service (e.g., babysitting, car washing, pet sitting, chores, making dinner, organizing an outing).
- GIVE A HANDMADE GIFT like a memoir of cherished memories with that person, a book of family recipes, a collage of pictures and mementos, or a calendar filled with the birthdays and anniversaries of friends and family.
- OFFER TO TEACH A SKILL YOU POSSESS (e.g., knitting, photography, computer skills, financial planning, a foreign language, music lessons, canning tomatoes, cooking a favorite recipe).
- CONSIDER LESS GIMMICKY, LESS COMMERCIAL GIFTS for children, such as arts/crafts supplies, books, a magnifying glass, or building blocks.
- CREATE A PAPERLESS HOLIDAY LETTER on the computer and email it to friends and family. If you do send cards, by mail, make your own cards or buy cards made from 100% recycled materials.
- HAVE A WHITE ELEPHANT PARTY at the office instead of traditional gift exchange, where each person brings a wrapped secondhand item in good condition, or do a cookie exchange.
- DRAW NAMES IN YOUR FAMILY FOR GIFT-GIVING (for extra fun and surprise, make it “Secret Santa”), so that you can put more time and thought into one gift instead of having to give to several people.
- SHOP FOR USED ITEMS for all or most of your holiday gifts (e.g., local thrift store, Craigslist, Freecycle, used products on Amazon or eBay).
- SHARE THE GIFT OF MUSIC by caroling, and include visits to elderly neighbors or a nursing home. Or, gather friends and family for an in-home holiday sing-a-long.
- GIVE BACK TO YOUR COMMUNITY by preparing care packages for the homeless, or volunteering at an organization to help those in need during the holiday season.
- ADOPT A “LESS IS MORE” ATTITUDE toward holiday decorating. Opt for natural trimmings such as clippings from local evergreens and holly.
