TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

The Transportation Services Department transported over 24,600 eligible students to and from school during the 2017-2018 school year. The Department provides annual in-service training for all bus drivers and bus assistants covering such topics as student behavior management, bullying, defensive driving and winter weather driving practices, student evacuations, first aid and CPR certification, special needs, and other relevant topics.

A total of 321 school buses, to include buses used for class field trips, athletics, and other school-related activities, are thoroughly inspected three (3) times each year. All school bus drivers are subject to pre-employment, random and post-accident drug/alcohol testing, criminal background and personal driving record checks, and all drivers must pass a stringent school bus driver (CDL) physical each year.

All Carroll County Public Schools offer a variety of reasonably priced school breakfasts and lunches that meet federal nutritional guidelines for school age children. Free and reduced price meals are available to those students who qualify under federally established guidelines.

All foods offered in the school meals programs are approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Students enjoy items such as whole grain pizza with low-fat cheese, deli sandwiches, and fresh entrée salads. School meals are calorically age-appropriate and offer balanced nutrient content within the guidelines of the National Child Nutrition Program.
